National recovery and resilience plans

- Access to the Facility based on National Plans, drawn up and submitted by Member States
- Strategic orientations for the preparation of national recovery and resilience plans is set out in the Commission's 2021 Annual Sustainable Growth Strategy
- Detailed guidance and standard template
- Drafts to be submitted as of 15 October 2020 (final deadline: 30 April 2021)
- Member States are already engaging with the Commission on the preparation of their recovery and resilience plans





Assessing the national plans

Commission's assessment will consider whether the plans:

- contribute to effectively addressing challenges identified in the relevant countryspecific recommendations;
- contain measures that effectively contribute to the green and digital transitions;



• contribute to strengthening the growth potential, job creation and economic and social resilience of the Member State.

-> Commission's assessment will be approved by the Council



Why do we need to assess DNSH?

Explicit references in the RRF Regulation and accompanying documents:

- Council general approach: link to Article 17 of the Taxonomy Regulation (in recital 11, article 15 (RRPs), and article 16 (assessment)).
- EP compromise

And in:

- Next Generation EU Communication of 27 May
- Annual Sustainable Growth Strategy
- Guidelines and template for Member States on their Recovery and Resilience Plans
- <u>Caveat</u>: Our work is based on the Council general approach. This presentation may need to be updated in light of the outcome of ongoing trilogues.



Scope (based on the Council mandate)

- DNSH applies to each measure in the RRP (i.e. each investment and each reform)
- Not limited to 'green' measures
- Not limited to climate change measures



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Green tagging

- 30% climate mainstreaming target for MFF and NGEU (EUCO conclusions of July)
- 37% climate mainstreaming target for each RRP
